372,060 Meals Served

Our hot meal program provided nutritious food to thousands of people challenged by homelessness, poverty, and disabilities.



10,000+ Nights of Shelter

Our residential programs offered refuge to more than 141 people as they worked to gain sobriety, health, housing, and employment.



25,849 Volunteer Hours

Our organization inspires compassionate volunteers to serve in the café, offering a meaningful experience for both individuals and business groups.



569,206 Pounds of Food

We've created a system to rescue surplus food, distribute it to those in need, and prevent it from going to waste. We also share food with peers to extend our impact.

Transitional Housing: Ending Homelessness and Suffering

Blanchet House operates a transitional housing program for men in downtown Portland, offering accommodations for up to 45 residents who are working to rebuild their lives through employment, improved health, and stable housing.

During his time in the program, David S. celebrated one year and four months of sobriety. Despite a difficult start in life, he’s now optimistic about the future, having found safety and support within our community.

“I started doing drugs when I was 12, so my homelessness really started at that point. I finally got my life back on track last year,” David shared. “I like the safety and security of Blanchet. Ain’t nobody hurting me or taking my stuff.”

When asked what he wishes others understood, David said: “Have a little more empathy. A little more patience, try to understand a little bit more. We’re not all bad people. I think the majority would succeed if just given some love.”

Today, David gives back by mentoring his peers and modeling what’s possible through compassion, consistency, and community.
